



What is the University Pathways Program?

The **University Pathways Program (UPP)** is a 3-day residential for students held annually for each year group in the school holidays. The UPP is designed to give young people the guidance and expertise to make informed decisions about their future through workshops focusing on careers, personal/professional skill development, work expectations and university.

Deakin Explore

In 2016 Deakin University launched an excellent Web App called [Explore Deakin](#). This resource allows students to kick-start their course and career exploration. Students can start with courses that lead to a career, or start with careers to find courses that lead to it. Students can filter courses and careers by what matters to them; each course and career lists others that are similar thus allowing students to broaden their options, and students can save their favourite courses and careers to access later, and even share them by email, Facebook and even Twitter.

Bachelor of Medical Imaging at Deakin

Deakin University offers a 4-year Medical Imaging – otherwise known as Medical Diagnostic Radiography – at its Geelong Waurn Ponds Campus. The course provides students with the opportunity to develop the knowledge, skills and clinical expertise for them to practise as a registered diagnostic radiographer once accredited by AHPRA. The program

Students get to use the latest equipment, and learn basic x-ray techniques, before advancing to more complex medical imaging procedures such as general radiography, digital vascular imaging, mammography, computed tomography (CT), general ultrasound (U/S) and magnetic resonance imaging (MRI).

Students undertake substantial clinical practice in clinical centres, medical imaging clinics and hospitals, as well as at Deakin's own three-roomed, state-of-the-art medical imaging training unit. Clinical placements typically take place at facilities across rural and regional areas of south-west Victoria. Interstate placements may be available at the expense of the student.

Other areas of study include medical radiation science linked to principles of medical imaging, biological sciences, plus important ethical and legal aspects of health care that will inform and support your future clinical practice.

The VCE entry requirements are Units 3 and 4: a study score of at least 30 in English (EAL) or at least 25 in English other than EAL; and a study score of at least 25 in one of Biology, Chemistry or Physics; and a study score of at least 22 in one of Maths: Mathematical Methods (any) or Maths: Specialist Mathematics.

Subject Bonuses may also be awarded: A study score of 40 in any English equals 3 aggregate points per study. A study score of 35 in Biology, Chemistry, Maths: Mathematical Methods (any), Maths: Specialist Mathematics or Physics equals 3 aggregate points per study. A study score of 35 in any English equals 1 aggregate point per study. A study score of 30 in Biology, Chemistry, Maths: Mathematical Methods (any), Maths: Specialist Mathematics or Physics equals 2 aggregate points per study. Overall maximum of 10 points.



Swinburne University

Swinburne is both a **university and a TAFE provider**. Its main campus is in Hawthorn, right by Glenferrie station. It also has campuses in Croydon and Wantirna. It offers courses through from Certificates to Doctorates.

GROWTH - Swinburne experienced a **15% increase** in first preference applications for courses for 2017 over the previous year. There was also a 5% increase in offers of places at Swinburne. This was despite an overall fall in offers in Victoria of 6%. **Health Sciences** experienced the greatest

increase of 117% over the last year. Design achieved an 18% increase, Computer Sciences/ICT increased by 16%, Business by 15% and Media and Communications by 13%.

SCHOLARSHIPS - From 2017 onwards, scholarships of \$5,000pa will be automatically offered to Swinburne applicants who receive an ATAR of 95 or more (no separate application required). Various grants are also available (apply direct to Swinburne). In addition, the **High Achievers Program** (HAP) will provide students receiving an ATAR of 95 or more with mentors, a personalised program, projects, and one-on-one assistance.

New courses at Swinburne in 2017 will be the **Bachelor of Nursing** (with a technology focus) and the **Bachelor of Engineering Practice**. There will also be a **Diploma of Advanced Technologies**.

Swinburne is now offering a Masters degree in **OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY**, and from 2018 – 2020 will introduce Masters degrees in **PHYSIOTHERAPY, DIETETICS and SPEECH PATHOLOGY**.

Swinburne Early Leaders Program (ELP)

*The **Early Leaders Program (ELP)** enables students to identify, catalogue and articulate their learning experiences - both in and outside the classroom - providing students with a portfolio of skills, which can be used to seek tertiary education or employment.*

This program has been specifically designed for Year 11 students who want to [maximise their employability and potential for career success](#).

Swinburne's ELP is an assessed program for students who can demonstrate their applied knowledge and skill within a particular area. It recognises many of the activities secondary students are already involved in and encourages them to expand their knowledge.

Swinburne's ELP is made up of **four categories** that are designed to challenge a student's knowledge and skill within a chosen area.

Students must complete both core categories and choose one elective to be awarded credit:

- Research/Academic skills (core)
- Career Development skills (core)
- Creativity (elective)
- Community engagement (elective)

Each category has activity requirements that students must meet in order to demonstrate their skillset. They will also need to create links between these activities and the skills that are required for further study and employment.

On successful completion, students are awarded credit towards the Swinburne Emerging Leaders Program, which is for current Swinburne Students.

So, what are the benefits of participating in the ELP?

The ELP has many benefits for students and provides a valuable resource for use in applications for employment and further study.

Benefits include:

- Endorsement of the student as a Swinburne Early Leader candidate and Swinburne representative for their school

- Successful ELP students will receive an award badge, certified by Swinburne
- Invitation to one-on-one personal course counselling prior to the VTAC application close date or anytime thereafter
- Free VCE revision tickets
- Personal invitation to all relevant Swinburne events

All Year 11 students are encouraged to apply. The Early Leaders Program will commence 8 March 2017.

Career in Event Planning

The Good Universities Guide indicates that an **event planner** or **event coordinator** plans and organises special events, including parties, wedding receptions, product launches, banquets, meetings, conferences and conventions. Successful event planners –

- enjoy working with people
- good organisational and time management skills
- have very attention to detail
- good interpersonal and supervisory skills
- good communication skills
- neat personal appearance
- comfortable working with computers
- able to negotiate, delegate and work under pressure

Depending on the size of the establishment, events coordinators may work independently or as part of a team. They often work irregular hours, and on weekends and public holidays. **Learn more at [Good Universities Guide - Events](#)**
